INVOLVEMENT

Our school board members have continued to grow through their involvement with the Wisconsin Association of School Boards. On October 19, Vice President Quin Brunette attended the WASB regional meeting (top photo). He networked with other Wisconsin school board members and heard a presentation on the 2021-23 state budget from the WASB government relations staff. At the October 25 board meeting, four of our board members were recognized for advancing to a new WASB achievement level (bottom photo). WASB achievement levels range from 1-5, with 5 being the highest honor. Jonathan Cagle, Kevin Stachowiak, and Nancy Zaborowski all advanced to Level 2, and Karen Mikolainis achieved Level 1 status. Quin Brunette currently has a Level 3 status! Throughout the fall, President Jonathan Cagle has attended WASB President Meetings, where school board presidents from throughout the state come together to learn about things such as how to most effectively run a school board meeting and how to remain compliant with the legal aspects of a school board.




BUDGET, MILL RATE, & TAX LEVY

In utilizing the funds allocated to Whitnall by the State of Wisconsin and local taxpayers, we were able to create both a balanced budget and decrease the local tax levy and mill rate.

While there will be no additional state funding for school districts for the next two years, based on the governor's state budget, we were able to keep a projected balanced budget for the 2021-22 school year. A district's total revenue comes from four main sources: local taxes, state sources, federal sources, and payments from other districts. See the pie chart below for this year's breakdown. We will utilize federal ESSER funds when possible to help defray some allowable costs under the strict spending guidelines of those funds. ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief) dollars are part of the American Rescue Plan and are provided to school districts to help sustain the safe operation of schools and address the impact of the pandemic on the nation's students. We are also facing some other challenges in our current budget, such as very high health insurance costs, substitute teacher shortages, potential high cost special education expenses, and continued COVID protocol expenses. The district will continue to monitor these costs and work diligently to adjust the current strategy when necessary to stay within the current budget.

The mill rate has decreased nearly 15.5% since the 2017-18 school year and decreased 2.07% this year (from \$8.71 to \$8.53). Mill rate refers to, on average across the district, how many dollars a taxpayer will pay in the school portion of their tax bill for every \$1,000 of property value. The school portion of one's tax bill can fluctuate from the average based on a number of factors including your specific municipality's property values. Whitnall succeeded in decreasing the school tax rate overall, but we do not control how all of your taxes get allocated. The school district reports the mill rate based on equalized property values across the district as reported by the Wisconsin Department of Revenue. The tax levy, which is the total tax that all community members pay to fund the district, has decreased nearly 16% since the 2017-18 school year and decreased yet again this year.




MILL RATE




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
6 | STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

The Whitnall School District continues to ensure that every graduate is prepared to realize their full potential to have a positive impact on both local and global communities. Annually, our 3rd-8th graders and 10th grade students take the Wisconsin State Forward Exam. Additionally, our 11th grade students take the ACT exam as our state test. The 3rd grade English Language Arts (ELA) data, the 8th grade math data, and the 11th grade ACT results are key indicators for our district to ensure that our students are on track for graduation and future success. These three data points are also used as key factors for the district's state report card.

Whitnall's 3rd grade ELA achievement results of 48% proficient or advanced surpassed the state average of 31.3%. Additionally, Whitnall's 8th grade math achievement results of 30.9% proficient or advanced also stayed above the state average of 25.9%.



ACT AVERAGE COMPOSITE SCORE



In contrast to our above state average scores in 3rd grade ELA and 8th grade math, our ACT average composite score of 18.6 fell below the state average of 19.1. We noticed the drop in spring and had time to respond for the current school year. The Whitnall School District hired four additional core content teachers at the high school (ELA, math, science, social studies) with ESSER dollars in order to:

- Address re-entry of virtual students
- Manage student-teacher ratio
- Create credit-recovery courses with a rigorous curriculum
- Lead 7-12th grade curriculum alignment to address learning gaps
