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The Superintendent's Message

I recently transitioned to a new computer, and as I was moving documents over, I ran across the results of our 2017 *Hopes for a Whitnall Graduate* community survey, which over 600 parents, staff, and community members responded to. Looking back, I am proud that we have made significant progress on the priorities that emerged from that survey.



In the past five years: We have passed a facilities referendum, while maintaining a declining mill rate. We have added career pathways in manufacturing, computer science/IT, and health

sciences. We have strengthened our pupil services team and mental health resources by nearly doubling staff serving in the areas of special education, social work, and counseling. We have expanded academic opportunities by offering more exploratory classes for middle and elementary students in areas such as coding, manufacturing, and world languages and by offering more Advanced Placement courses at the high school level. We have increased parent and community engagement through efforts like focus groups, our Parent Learning Academy (more on this on page 6), and enhanced communication, including but not limited to the introduction of this very newsletter.

All of this was made possible by the resilience of the Whitnall community. Resilience means not abandoning long-term goals for short term or easy wins. Resilience means staying the course, despite challenges and distractions. When I look back to 2017, I can confidently say that we have traveled far upon the path to where the community hoped to be. But there is never an *end* to progress, so we travel on. Please continue to follow our work by watching or attending our board meetings, visiting our website, or reaching out directly. Your engagement is energizing and essential.

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Board Goal

In November of 2021, the Whitnall School Board revisited the board goal that they had developed and adopted in May of 2021. The goal read:

"Over the next year (2021-2022), we as a board will work collaboratively with district administration to develop a dashboard, so that we can track district performance as measured by finances/budget, student achievement/success and employee engagement."

As the board worked on this, it became clear that the board goal was written in a way that focused more on the means (a district dashboard) than on the ends, which was always intended to be greater accountability to constituents through better understanding of district data. Therefore, the board goal was rewritten and now reads:

"By the end of the 2021-22 school year, school board members will increase accountability to district constituents by tracking district performance on student achievement/success, employee engagement, and finances/budget as evidenced by each board member's competence in relaying detailed district data as well as strategic plan benchmarks."

The updated goal was informed by the action area Accountability from The Key Work of School Boards. The Key Work of School Boards defines Accountability as the capacity to "maintain public confidence through a shared understanding of expectations, roles and responsibilities, and standards/desired results." Research through the NSBA Center for Public Education found that indicators of school board effectiveness include engaging in goal setting, monitoring progress, being data savvy, and possessing detailed knowledge of the district.

To meet their goal, the board is receiving more data reports around students, employees, and operations. These reports are archived on the new Board Goal page of the district website. The community is encouraged to visit the page to see what data board members should be able to discuss competently. The reports are all linked, so community members may also explore the data themselves!

Wisconsin State Education Convention

In January, four Whitnall School Board members attended the Wisconsin State Education Convention held by the Wisconsin Association of School Boards. Board members, superintendents, and school business officials from across the state came together to hear from exhibitors and speakers from across the country. The convention featured topics such as equity in education, school finances, and effective leadership.

Not only was Whitnall represented in the attendees, Whitnall was also represented among the presenters! Whitnall School Board Vice President Quin Brunette joined board members from the Shorewood School District and the Menomonee Falls School District to share effective strategies for leveraging community input!

Staff Spotlight

In December of 2021, Anabel Weeks, Edgerton Elementary Art Teacher, became a National Board Certified Teacher! Below is Anabel's description of her journey.

"In 2018, I decided that National Board certification was a challenge that I wanted to take on personally and professionally. I spent a school year arduously planning, video taping my lessons, writing, editing, and studying for the exam component. My weekends and school breaks were spent in the empty Edgerton art room collecting evidence, watching videos of myself teaching, and writing, writing, writing. I submitted all four components in April of 2019 and anxiously waited for the results, which wouldn't be posted until December 2019, 8 months later. The results came back and I scored well on 3 of the 4 components, which meant I did not certify. My heart broke, but my resolve did not diminish; I had committed myself to success and I got busy working on the remaining component. I was almost at the finish line when COVID hit. The National Board offered a deferment, and I decided to take it. I began anew on the remaining component in the 2020-21 school year, with determination to get it completed, regardless of the challenges the pandemic presented with teaching. I submitted in June 2021 and found out in December 2021 that I passed and was now a National Board Certified Teacher in the area of Art, Early and Middle Childhood-making me 1 of 6 in the state of Wisconsin! The journey to National Board certification was tiring and extremely demanding, but it was transformative to my teaching and my classroom. It forced me to face and improve areas of weakness in my teaching, recalibrate, crack open and deeply examine my teaching practice. The experience was more intense, heartbreaking, exhausting, gratifying, and important than I ever anticipated, but as promised by many before me, it has deeply and forever did not diminish." changed me for the better as a teacher."

The other activities-such as NHS, Red Gen, and Red Cross Club-are further opportunities for me to volunteer, with each having a unique focus. NHS allows me to volunteer with the Whitnall community, RedGen allows me to help spread awareness around student health (both mental and physical), and Red Cross Club allows me to help causes such as homelessness. Academically, I have set high standards for myself. I have taken a total of nine Advanced Placement courses and four college classes throughout high school. I pride myself on my academics, because I truly enjoy learning. Looking to the future, I hope to graduate in 4 years with a masters and bachelors in molecular and cellular biology. In my free time, I really enjoy music. I've been playing piano since I was five years old, singing since I was seven, and I taught myself guitar when I was thirteen. 
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Summer 2022 Offerings

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ESSER III Funding Stakeholder Input
